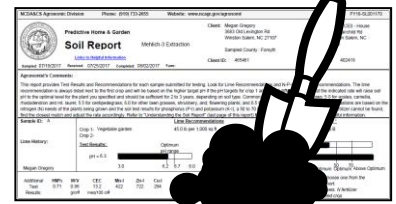
Other Garden Organizing Goal: _____

Diversity and Inclusion:

- Increase the racial/ethnic diversity of garden leadership and create a welcoming environment for people from different cultures (e.g., nondiscrimination policy, bilingual programs, etc.).
- Make the garden accessible to people with disabilities (e.g., smooth paths, extra-tall beds, etc.)
- Host inter-generational gardening activities.

Sustainable Horticulture:

- Get soil tests, and use the results to decide what fertilizers and soil amendments to apply.
- Make a crop plan with optimum planting dates and crop rotation.
- Grow vegetable varieties that are resistant to diseases and insects.
- Plant cover crops for soil improvement.
- Use organic pest control (create habitat for beneficial insects, diversify crops, clean up crop residue, etc.)
- Use organic weed control (crop rotation, careful fertilization & watering, cover crops, mulching, etc.)
- Plant native plants to support beneficial insects.
- Start composting or improve composting practices.
- Season extension: Use low tunnels to grow vegetables in early spring and late fall.
